


Our Catholic Tradition

- The three Sacraments of Initiation celebrate membership into the Church: Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist. (ccc, 1212)
- The Sacraments of Healing help people in need of forgiveness and healing during times of physical and spiritual sickness. (ccc, 1421)
- The Sacraments at the Service of Communion celebrate people's commitment to serve God and the community. (ccc. 1534)

New Life in God


How does someone become a member of the Catholic Church?

Most people receive new life in God and become members of the Catholic Church when they are baptized as babies. This story is about an adult who found new life in Christ.

New Life Begins

Steve's family was watching a video of the Easter Vigil celebration. Aunt Kim and the other adults had celebrated three Sacraments in one evening. First, they were baptized. Then, they were confirmed with the anointing of **Sacred Chrism**. Finally, they received Holy Communion.

After Mass, everyone was laughing and hugging Aunt Kim and the others. Steve enjoyed all the excitement. He looked very happy on the video!



Life in the Church

After they saw the video, the family looked at photos. "Look, Steve," his sister Laura said. "Here are pictures of your Baptism. And here you are on your First Communion day."

The family noticed some differences between the celebrations. Baby Steve wore a white baptismal gown, but Aunt Kim wore a brown robe before her Baptism and changed into a white one after. Steve received First Communion in second grade. Kim was an adult, and she received the Eucharist on the same day she was baptized.

Still, some things were the same. Steve's godfather was Aunt Kim's sponsor, too. Father John had baptized both Steve and Aunt Kim.

Aunt Kim celebrated three Sacraments at the Easter Vigil. Sacraments are signs that come from Jesus. Through the power of the Holy Spirit, Jesus works in and through the Sacraments to give grace, a share in God's life and work.

Church Membership

What are the Sacraments of Initiation?

From the beginning of the Church, the Sacraments of Initiation have been an important and necessary part of our faith. Baptism is the first Sacrament we receive. It leads to the other Sacraments of Initiation: Confirmation and Eucharist. Listen to Peter speak about Baptism to a crowd of people who did not know about Jesus.

God's Word

Many Are Baptized

On Pentecost, Peter said to the crowd, "Repent and be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins; and you will receive the gift of the holy Spirit."

Peter told the people that Jesus' promise was meant for everyone. Many of them accepted his message. About 3,000 people were baptized that day. Based on Acts 2:38-41

Receiving and Sharing God's Love

In each of the Sacraments of Initiation, you see the actions and hear the words of the minister, who acts in the name of the Holy Trinity. Jesus, the Son, by the power of the Holy Spirit, shares with you the love of the Father. In the Sacrament of the Eucharist we honor Christ's **Real Presence** and receive him in Holy Communion.

Baptism	The priest or deacon pours water on or immerses the person, saying, "I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."	Removes Original Sin, forgives personal sin, and gives new life in Christ; marks the person as a member of Christ's Body, the Church; unites all Christians
Confirmation	The bishop or priest lays hands on the person's head and then anoints him or her with Sacred Chrism, saying, "Be sealed with the Gift of the Holy Spirit."	Seals and completes Baptism; strengthens the person's bond with the Church; unites the person more fully with Christ; strengthens him or her in living the faith
Eucharist	The priest prays the Eucharistic Prayer, consecrating bread and wine, saying "This is my Body, which will be given up for youThis is the chalice of my blood poured out for you and for many."Then he shares Christ's Body and Blood with the Church community.	Brings forgiveness of venial sins and an increase of grace; unites all who share the Eucharist into the one Body of Christ

How can you help welcome new members into the Catholic Church?

When a good friend or relative visits your family, or when a baby brother or sister joins your family, you welcome that person. You might have a party. You might make a sign that says "Welcome!" You might show a visitor where to sit at the dinner table.



The people celebrating the Sacraments of Initiation are becoming members of your parish family. You can make new members feel welcome, too. Here are some ways you can let them know that you are glad they have joined the Church:

- In some parishes, babies are baptized at a Sunday Mass. If you are present during one of these celebrations, pay close attention and pray for those being baptized.
- Every year at the Easter Vigil, people join the Catholic Church. They receive the Sacraments of Christian Initiation. Pray for those joining the Church. As a class project, create "Welcome to the Church" cards for them.
- First Communions and Confirmations take place as part of parish life, too. Ask a parish leader for a list of those preparing to receive these Sacraments. Select one name and pray for that person.

People of Faith

Saint John the Baptist, first century

Saint John the Baptist was Jesus' cousin. An angel came to Saint John's father, Zechariah, to say that he and his wife Elizabeth would have a baby. Mary, the Mother of Jesus, visited Elizabeth when she was pregnant. John grew up to be a preacher. He prepared the way for Jesus by telling people the Good News that God would come to save his People. When Jesus was ready to start his ministry, Saint John baptized him in the River Jordan. Saint John was killed for pointing out the bad things that King Herod was doing.

How They Understand the Sacraments of Initiation

Because third-graders are just beginning to form social groups and understand what it means to belong to a community, this is an ideal time for your child to understand the Sacraments of Initiation as the way in which one enters the Church community. While many third-graders will not remember their Baptism, most of them will have celebrated another Sacrament of Christian Initiation, Eucharist, for the first time just last year. Their continued celebration of Eucharist reinforces their participation at the family table.



CONSIDER THIS >>>

Do you think of your Baptism as an event, or the beginning of a relationship?

While many of us think of Baptism as a happy event that happened in our lives or the lives of our children, we often do not see it as a moment that began a life of relationship, much like a wedding. Baptism sets us on a lifetime journey of growing ever more deeply in our knowledge and love of Jesus Christ. "In Baptism, the Holy Spirit moves us to answer Christ's call to holiness. In Baptism, we are asked to walk by the light of Christ and to trust in his wisdom. We are invited to submit our hearts to Christ with ever deeper love" (USCCA p. 196).
