

The Great Commandment

How is the Great Commandment like the Ten Commandments?

We all know that rules are important. We understand that obeying rules, even when we don't like them, helps keep order. But Jesus taught that keeping the Ten Commandments includes more than checking off items on a list. Each Commandment shows you a way to love God and love others with your whole heart and soul.

Great Commandment

the twofold command to love God above all and your neighbor as yourself. It sums up all God's laws.



The Greatest Commandment

"You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. The whole law and the prophets depend on these two commandments." Matthew 22:37–40

Therefore, the **Great Commandment** to love God above all and your neighbor as yourself sums up the Ten Commandments, the whole law, and what the prophets taught.



Following Jesus

There are many ways that you can follow Jesus by sharing your love with others. Once, Jesus asked a young man to show his love for others in a very generous way.

The Rich Young Man

One day when Jesus was teaching, a young man asked, "What must I do to live forever with God?"

Jesus answered, "Keep the commandments."

"Which commandments?" the young man asked. Jesus listed some of the Ten Commandments for him.

"I keep all those commandments!" the young man said happily. "What else do I need to do?"

"If you wish to be perfect," Jesus said, "go, sell what you have and give to [the] poor, and you will have treasure in heaven. Then come, follow me."

The young man's smile faded, for he was very rich. He could not imagine giving everything away, so he went away sad. Based on Matthew 19:16-22


Jesus knew that the man's love for his possessions could keep him from loving God completely. When Jesus tested him to see how important his possessions were, the man could not part with them.

Theological Virtues the virtues of faith, hope, and charity, which are gifts from God that guide our relationship with him

faith the theological virtue that makes it possible for us to believe in God and all that he helps us understand about himself. Faith leads us to obey God.

hope the theological virtue that helps us trust in the true happiness God wants us to have and in Jesus' promises of eternal life, and to rely on the help of the Holy Spirit

charity the theological virtue of love. It directs us to love God above all things and our neighbor as ourselves, for the love of God.

Love God

How can you live the Great Commandment?

The first step in living the Great Commandment is to understand that God wants you to love him. The Theological Virtues help you to live in a loving relationship with God. Virtues are good spiritual habits that strengthen you and help you to do what is right and good. They develop over time with our practice and openness to God's grace.

The Theological Virtues of faith, hope and charity are gifts from God. When we use these gifts, we are drawn into a deeper relationship with God. We also come to a deeper understanding that loving God leads to sharing God's love with others.

Love Others

God the Father sent his Son to show all people how to live in love. Jesus showed that the power of love can make a difference. Jesus cared most for those who were poor, helpless, and suffering. He calls his followers to do the same.

Faith	God created you with the ability to know and trust him. You make the choice to seek God and believe in him.
Норе	This virtue helps you trust in God and the happiness he wants you to have.
Charity	The greatest of all Theological Virtues. This gift makes it possible for you to love God above everything else, and others as yourself.

Acts of Charity

The strength of the Holy Spirit, whom Jesus sent, gives you the power to reach out to others in love, as Jesus did. The Holy Spirit breathed charity into you at your Baptism.

Jesus' Great Commandment tells you to love others as you love yourself. Christians see the needs of others and help meet those needs. The Church has named seven acts of kindness you can do to meet the physical needs of others. They are called the **Corporal Works of Mercy**. The **Spiritual Works of Mercy** name what you can do for others to care for the needs of their heart, mind, and soul. 


People of Faith


Saint Katharine Drexel, 1858 – 1955

Saint Katharine Drexel came from a wealthy family, but she devoted her money and her life to those who were poor. She did missionary work among African Americans and Native Americans. She insisted that all people be treated fairly, no matter what their race. She founded the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament and also established schools on Native American reservations and the first and only Catholic university for African Americans. She believed it was her life's work to live out the Corporal Works of Mercy.

How does your relationship with God affect how you love others?

The more aware we are of God's love for us, the more that love moves through us. As Catholics, we know that "Scripturally and theologically, the Christian moral life begins with a loving relationship with God, a covenant love made possible by the sacrifice of Christ. The Commandments and other moral rules are given to us as ways of protecting the values that foster love of God and others. They provide us with ways to express love, sometimes by forbidding whatever contradicts love" (USCCA, p. 318).
