

God's Call

What does it mean to have a vocation?

Everyone has a **vocation**. A vocation is God's plan for our lives: the purpose for which he made us. Sometimes God calls a person to a special role. When Jesus was ready to begin his work, he gathered some friends to help him.

The Call of the First Disciples

One day, Jesus was walking by the Sea of Galilee. He saw two brothers, Peter and Andrew. Andrew cast a net into the sea. The brothers were fishermen.

Jesus said to them, "Come follow me. I will make you fishers of men." At once, they left their nets and followed Jesus.

Jesus continued walking. He came upon two more brothers, James and John. They were in a boat with their father, fixing their nets. Jesus called them. Immediately they left their nets and their father and followed Jesus.

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Vocation and God's Kingdom

Not everyone hears God's call as clearly as the first disciples did. Sometimes it takes many years of praying and listening to know your vocation.

All vocations can make the **Kingdom of God** more visible. God's Reign is the world of love, peace, and justice that God intends. Jesus announced the Kingdom and revealed it in his life and ministry. But God's Kingdom will not be here fully until the end of time when Christ returns in glory. Until then, we are called to help God increase his rule in our lives and in the world.

Ways to Respond to God's Call

The Catholic Church recognizes four ways in which people respond to God's call to serve: through the priesthood, consecrated religious life, committed single life, or the married life. Consecrated religious life is a state of life in which a person usually makes **vows**, or promises, that help them to grow in holiness. Baptism sets us all on the journey of holiness. Priests and married couples take vows as well.

Serving the Church

How can we use our gifts to serve?

The Church recognizes that some people may be called to serve God by remaining single. The dedicated single life is also a vocation. Both single and married people are part of the **laity**. All who are baptized are invited to serve the universal Church and the parish community. Here are some ways we do this.

Many Gifts

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The **pastor** and **pastoral associate** lead and serve the parish community.

The **permanent deacon** is ordained to assist the pastor—especially at Eucharist, marriages, and funerals—and to perform works of charity.

An **extraordinary minister of Holy Communion** not only helps distribute Holy Communion at Mass, but also takes Holy Communion to those who are sick or housebound.

The **lector** proclaims the Word of God at the Liturgy of the Word.

Altar servers assist the priest at Mass by carrying the Roman Missal, the sacred vessels, and the cross.

Musicians practice and lead the assembly in sung prayer.

Catechists teach Scripture and the Catholic faith to members of the parish.

Venerable Anne de Guigné

Venerable Anne de Guigné's beloved "Papa" died when she was four years old. She decided to become as good and as kind as she could. As she grew older, one of her teachers noticed how happy Anne was. The teacher asked Anne for the secret to happiness in life. Anne replied, "Jesus loves me very much, and I love him very much." Anne knew Jesus' love because she had a special gift for prayer. She received her First Holy Communion when she was six. From then on, she offered up her prayers for all those who did not know and love Jesus.



Using Your Gifts

You can already use your gifts from God to make a difference. Discerning your vocation means learning, through prayer, about what God wants you to do. You don't have to do something big and public to make the world a better place. Like Venerable Anne, you can do it quietly and privately.

Like the disciples and Venerable Anne de Guigné, you too have a calling. Your call, like that of all Catholics, came to you at your Baptism.



Blessed Frédéric Ozanam, 1813–1853

September 9

Blessed Frédéric Ozanam was born in Milan, Italy. For a time, he studied law. When he lived in Paris, he discovered a love for literature. His friends challenged him to find a way to live out his strong Christian beliefs in his everyday life. Frédéric realized that he had a call to help those in need. He helped found the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul, which still helps those in need, especially those who are poor. Frédéric was also a university professor and wrote many books. He tried to live out his vocation in all he did.

CHILDREN AT THIS AGE >>>

How They Understand Their Call from God As fourthgraders hear that God has a plan for their lives, they are capable of realizing that this plan is different from the one he has for anyone else. They have the free will to choose to follow—or not to follow—God's plan. With help and support from adults like you, your child can begin to better identify the talents and interests that can point to God's plan and also to see the opportunities to further explore God's path for his or her future.



CONSIDER THIS >>>

Do you think of your marriage as part of God's plan for you to grow in holiness?

God invites us to grow in holiness through our vocations. The vocation of marriage helps us become one with God by loving our spouse. As Catholics, we know that "God created man and woman out of love and commanded them to imitate his love in their relations with each other. . . . [Both] are equal in human dignity, and in marriage both are united in an unbreakable bond" (USCCA, p. 279).
