

What is a Sacrament?

Your life is filled with many signs. However, some signs have a deeper meaning, like a trophy that you worked hard to win or an American flag. Christians received the most precious sign of all in the **Incarnation**, when the Son of God became man. God the Father sent his Son, Jesus, as a sign of his love for all people. He pointed the way to God for all who followed him.

Jesus welcomed people like Peter and Zacchaeus, and they changed their lives for him. Jesus showed people God the Father's forgiveness. He healed some and called others to serve. Through Jesus' words and actions, many people experienced God's saving love. Because he is both Divine and human, Jesus made God and his love present.

"No one comes to the Father except through me," Jesus said to his Apostles at the Last Supper."If you know me, then you will also know my Father. From now on you do know him and have seen him" (John 14:6-7).

Visible Signs and Divine Actions

It was only after Jesus' Resurrection that his Apostles began to understand that Jesus was really God! Jesus had promised his followers that he would always be with them and that they would continue his saving work. A very important way that Jesus does this is through the Seven Sacraments. The Sacraments are effective signs of God's life, instituted by Christ and given to the Church. They are actions of the Holy Spirit at work in Christ's Body, the Church. Jesus is present in each of the Sacraments.

The Eucharist

What is the heart of our Catholic life?

Jesus often ate meals with his friends. On the night before he died, Jesus shared a Passover meal with his Apostles.



The Last Supper

Then [Jesus] took a cup, gave thanks, and said, "Take this and share it among yourselves; for I tell you [that] from this time on I shall not drink of the fruit of the vine until the kingdom of God comes." Then he took the bread, said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body, which will be given for you; do this in memory of me." And likewise the cup after they had eaten, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which will be shed for you." Luke 22:17–20

After Jesus was raised to new life and returned to the Father, his followers gathered weekly for the "breaking of the bread." They knew, as Catholics do today, that Jesus was present when they blessed and broke bread together as Jesus commanded. This celebration is called the **Eucharist**, the Sacrament in which Jesus gives himself and the bread and wine become his Body and Blood.

In the Eucharist, we remember, give thanks for, and share in the life, Death, and Resurrection of Jesus. The word *Eucharist* means "thanksgiving." At the beginning of Mass, you ask God's mercy because of your sins. Your venial sins can be forgiven by your participation in the Eucharist. You listen to the Word of God. You thank God the Father for the great gift of his Son. When you receive Jesus in Holy Communion, you are united with the other members of the Body of Christ.

When Jesus told the Apostles to "do this in memory of me," he did not mean only that they should break bread together. He meant that they should live their lives as he did. Living the Eucharist means loving, welcoming, and forgiving others. You live the Eucharist when you share with those who do not have what you do.



Mass is an excellent time for you to take an active role in your relationship with God. It is your chance to join with the rest of your parish in lifting your voices and souls in praise of God.




People of Faith

Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque, 1647–1690

Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque was born into a peasant family in France. From the time she was little, she had a special love for Jesus in the Eucharist. When she grew up, she joined a convent. While she was praying, she had several visions in which Jesus told her about his loving heart. He told her that he will give love and mercy to everyone who asks. Saint Margaret Mary taught people about the Devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. It includes going to Mass and receiving the Eucharist on the first Friday of each month.

CHILDREN AT THIS AGE >>>

How They Understand the Sacraments Fourth-graders, while still bound to their five senses, are better able than younger children to see the connections between rituals and their meanings. This can help them gain a deeper appreciation of the Seven Sacraments as they know that what they are seeing and hearing in sacramental celebrations is a sign of, and participation in, something invisible as well.



CONSIDER THIS >>>

Who do you know who understands the Eucharist as a sacred gift and not an obligation?

Perhaps we might see it the same way if we became more aware that Jesus' gift of his life is given again for us each time we receive the Eucharist. We need to open our hearts to receive the gift we long for: the gift of knowing we are loved that perfectly, that completely. As Catholics, "we need to remember that the Eucharist is the summit and source of our Christian life. Why? Because in the Eucharist is found the entire treasure of the Church— Jesus Christ" (USCCA, p.228).
