



- Divine Revelation is the way God makes himself and his plan known.
 God reveals himself through Sacred
 Scripture and Sacred Tradition. (CCC, 82)
- We can discover God by reflecting on the gifts of his creation. We use his gifts in the Seven Sacraments. (ccc, 1692)
- God puts longings in our hearts for him, and our response is faith. (ccc, 27)

God Reveals Himself

In what ways does God reveal himself to us?

We know that God is all-good, that he loves all of us, and that he wants us to be saved. He is eternal, just, merciful, and all-powerful. We know these things because God told us about himself through a process called **Divine Revelation**.


Learning about God

We can learn about God in many ways, including through all that he has created. However, God has revealed himself to us in a unique way through **Sacred Scripture** and **Sacred Tradition**.

Sacred Scripture is the collection of inspired writings also known as the Bible. God, the Bible's author, inspired its human writers, giving them the gift of the Holy Spirit to write about his saving truth. Scripture tells the story of God and his People in the two parts of the Bible, the Old and New Testaments.

Sacred Tradition is God's Word to the Church, beginning with what was passed down from the Apostles. Guided by the Holy Spirit, popes, bishops, members of councils, and scholars have safeguarded these teachings about God and what he has made known for future generations.

In God's Image

We also learn about God through his creation. The beauty of the desert, the majesty of mountains, and the complexity of animals all tell us something about God and his ways. The vastness of space gives us a glimpse of eternity.

People are God's most magnificent creation. God created us in his own image and likeness. The marvels within our bodies show us how much he cares about us.

Human beings, unlike the rest of creation, can think and choose. God created us with free will, or the ability to choose between good and evil. We are able to recognize and respond to God's goodness. We were also created with the desire to be in relationship with other people. As we relate to one another, we are revealing God to others.

God has given humans a unique role in creation. We are to respect and care for one another and for all of the rest of creation. Part of God's plan is for humans to live in communities that show that respect and care.

Praise God's Work

How are stewardship and God's providence connected?

Creation is all things that exist, made by God from nothing and held together by his love. The world was made for the glory of God, and the wonders of creation never cease to praise their Creator. In return, God in his **providence** cares for all he has created. This is one of many psalms that praise God, the Creator.



The Coming of God

Shout with joy to the LORD, all the earth; break into song; sing praise.

What are some ways in which God in his providence cares for humans?

Creation and the Sacraments

When Jesus wanted to create ways for humans to celebrate his presence after he returned to his Father, he thought of the works of his Father's creation. Jesus used gifts from God, such as water, oil, wheat, and grapes, to perform his saving works. When these created things are used in the Seven Sacraments, they remind you of God's creative power and make God's power present to you now. Strengthened by the Sacraments, you can continue Jesus' work in the world. Work and worship become one.

When you choose to care for creation, you help the world achieve its purpose: to praise God and show God's goodness. Caring for creation is a way to praise God through your actions.

In God's plan, the goodness of creation unfolds through time. All humans have a choice to help or harm the world during



their lives. You are the crown of God's creation, created in his image and likeness. The divine likeness of all human beings is the result of being created by God. Jesus invites you and all other people to reflect God's image by practicing **stewardship** of all God's gifts—time, talent, treasure, and the resources of creation.

When you care for any part of God's creation, you are sharing in his plan. What you do will echo his glory. Here are some ways to make sure that your stewardship of God's creation will be successful.



- 1. Circle any of these steps that you have followed in the past for a project.
- 2. Draw a star next to a step you want to try in the future.

10 Steps to Successful Stewardship of Creation

- Choose a small project that will improve the environment. Find something you can do in your neighborhood, so that you can see results.
- Work for changes that will last. If you can discover the cause of a problem, work on solving it.
- 3. Work with others who have experience. Often you can volunteer your time to groups. They will teach you what needs to be done.
- Respect the feelings, rights, and property of others. Another person may not agree with your opinions.
- 5. Be aware of how your actions will affect others. Remember that you are helping solve a problem, not blaming anyone.
- Create feelings of cooperation and goodwill. Always ask for permission and thank those who help you.
- 7. Ask yourself: How does my plan help? Who or what might my plan hurt?
- 8. Finish what you start. You will gain respect and more cooperation from others in the future.
- Follow up and evaluate. Plan a way to learn whether your action accomplished its purpose.
- 10. Ask God to bless what you have done.

People of Faith

Saint Hildegard of Bingen, 1098–1179

Saint Hildegard was an abbess, the head of a group of nuns, in Bingen, Germany. At a time when few women could read or write, Hildegard could do both. Her curiosity and love for God's creation led her to study nature. She wrote and illustrated books on gardening and herbal medicine. Hildegard knew that when you care for God's creation, you share in his plan for the entire world. She also composed music and painted pictures inspired by her love of nature.



How They Understand Stewardship of God's

Creation Fifth-graders often learn a great deal about science and nature in their classes at school. Many become quite concerned when they hear about endangered species and other crises in the environment. Their sense of purpose and autonomy increases when they know small, practical things they can do to make things better. And there is no better time than when we are young to get into good habits of environmental stewardship.
