New Life in Christ

Let Us Pray

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Sacraments of Initiation

What new life is given in Baptism?

At Baptism, you first received grace and began a new way of life. The Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist complete your initiation as a member of the Catholic Church, but they do not mark the end of your journey of faith. They are the beginning of this journey. The Sacraments of Initiation include Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist. Through these Sacraments, you are initiated into a relationship with Christ and celebrate membership in the Catholic Church. Through these Sacraments, we share in Christ's role as priest, prophet, and king.

As priests, we praise God, offer our lives to God, and pray with and for others. As prophets, we know the Church's teachings on morality and justice, stand up for what is right, and follow God's Word. As kings, we behave responsibly, act as leaders, and act with justice, mercy, and love.

Most Christians are baptized as infants, which is the customary practice of the Catholic Church. At Baptism, a person is reborn in Christ and freed from both Original Sin and personal sin. Through the Church, the grace of the Sacraments is given to sustain this new life. The Sacrament of Confirmation deepens the grace of Baptism. In both Baptism and **Confirmation**, we are anointed with **Sacred Chrism**.

The New Life of Grace

Paul compares the new life of Baptism with the Resurrection of Jesus. When a person is baptized, he or she is said to have “died” to sin. Paul points out that the baptized person then “rises” to new life in Christ in the community of the Church.

Scripture

Freedom from Sin; Life in God

As to his death, [Jesus] died to sin once and for all; as to his life, he lives for God. Consequently, you too must think of yourselves as [being] dead to sin and living for God in Christ Jesus. **Romans 6:10–11**

Catholic Faith Words

Confirmation the Sacrament that seals us with a special outpouring of the Gifts of the Holy Spirit, deepens the grace of Baptism, and strengthens us to give witness to Christ in the world

Sacred Chrism perfumed oil used for anointing in the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Holy Orders

Grace and Conversion

Through the Sacraments of the Church, God shares his divine life with you. The grace given in the Sacraments is not earned. It is a gift from God. You respond to God’s gift of grace by turning away from sin and living according to the law of love that Jesus taught. The movement away from sin and into the mystery of God’s love is called conversion. It begins with God’s call and is sustained through life by your cooperation with God’s grace.

One Step at a Time

How are the Sacraments of Initiation celebrated for adults?

Catholic Faith Words

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) the process by which adults and some children become members of the Catholic Church through the Sacraments of Initiation

catechumen a “learner,” or person preparing to celebrate the Sacraments of Initiation

sponsor a representative of the parish community who supports a catechumen celebrating the Sacraments of Initiation

Just as it takes time to become part of a family, so it takes time to prepare to be baptized and to be initiated into the Church. The Church welcomes new adult members through a step-by-step process called the **Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults**, or the Order of Christian Initiation.

United to Christ and to the Church

Although Jeremy was twenty-three years old, he still felt nervous when he rang the doorbell of Saint Benedict’s. As soon as Father Paul sat down with him, Jeremy said, “I’d like to become a Catholic. What tests do I have to take?” The priest smiled and said, “Let’s take this one step at a time. The process of becoming a member of the Church, which we call initiation, takes time.” He invited Jeremy to a gathering where he would meet people who were on a similar faith journey.



Becoming an Elect

After a few months, Jeremy decided he wanted to prepare for Baptism, and he became a **catechumen**. During this time, the lives of those committed to the faith were an example to him. Jeremy also had support from his **sponsor**, Ed. Ed came to sharing sessions at the church with Jeremy. He prayed with Jeremy and told him what being Catholic was like. Jeremy came to know and love the Christian way of life and the Catholic Church.

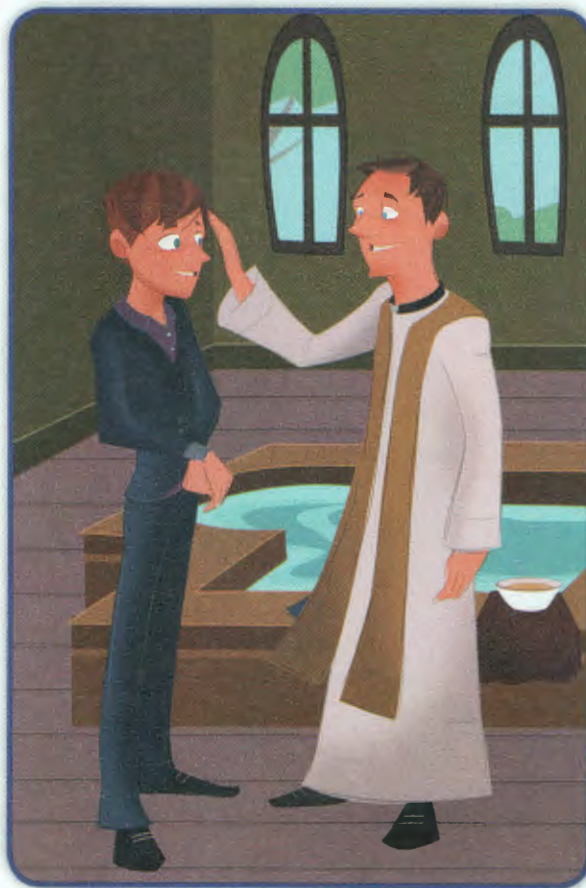
Many months later, on the First Sunday of Lent, Jeremy became one of the elect. This meant that he would celebrate the Sacraments of Initiation at the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday.

A Night to Remember

Finally, Holy Saturday arrived. At the baptismal pool, Father Paul asked Jeremy to declare his faith in God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. As Father Paul immersed Jeremy in the water three times, he said, "I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." Jeremy was given new life in Christ.

After a prayer to the Holy Spirit, Father Paul placed his hands on Jeremy's head and confirmed him with Sacred Chrism, saying, "Jeremy, be sealed with the Gift of the Holy Spirit."

At last, the moment came to receive the Eucharist. Jeremy stood before Father Paul to receive Holy Communion. "The Body of Christ, the Blood of Christ" echoed in his mind and heart as he returned to his



place after receiving Communion for the first time. Now, Jeremy felt truly united to Christ and to the Church.

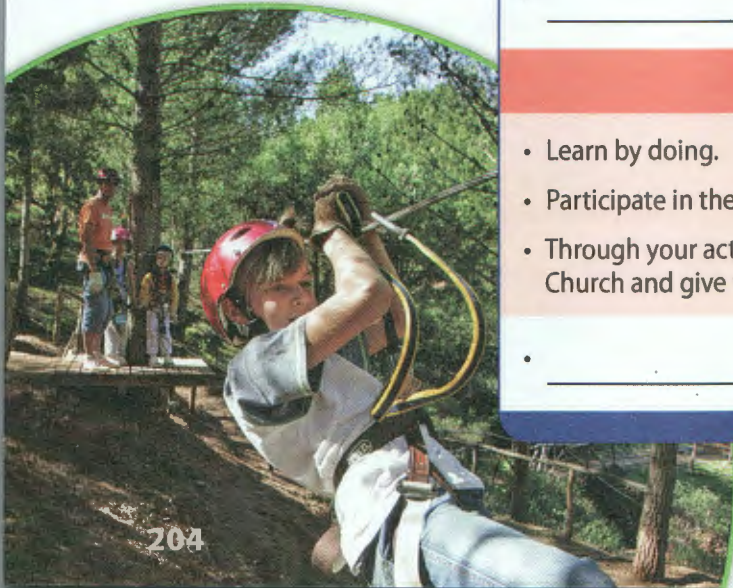
- Allow Church members to help you on your way. These people may include your family, your pastor, or your religion teacher.

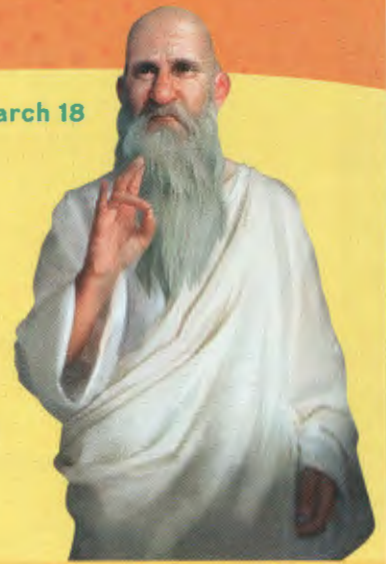


People of Faith

Saint Cyril of Jerusalem, 315–386

Saint Cyril was a great teacher. He lived in the same country that Jesus did. After he became a priest, the bishop of Jerusalem asked him to prepare catechumens for Baptism. Saint Cyril explained the beliefs of the Church to those wanting to join. We still have his lectures today. They tell us how people prepared for Baptism in the early Church. They also tell us how the Mass was celebrated. Years later, when he became the bishop of Jerusalem himself, Cyril continued to give these lectures. He knew it was very important for people to understand exactly what happens when they are baptized.

How They Understand the Sacraments of Initiation

Most fifth-graders do not remember their Baptism because it happened when they were babies. Because of this, they might miss the idea of conversion as applied to Christian Initiation. It is helpful for them to know the promises their parents made when they were baptized and how they can choose to “live out” their Baptism as children of God.
