

Seeking Justice


What does it mean to act justly?

The search for justice is a response to the natural moral law, rules about goodness that are written in our hearts and are natural to follow. The natural moral law expresses the God-given human dignity, or inner worth, of all persons. Anything that robs us of that dignity is unjust. Unborn children, the elderly, family members, enemies, people who live in other lands, people who are poor, even criminals in prison—all are humans with God-given dignity.

Justice means giving God and other people what is due to them. It is one of the **virtues** that help you grow in love for God and others. We learn about virtues and the Christian life in the Beatitudes, including “just” living.

God’s **grace** helps you live a virtuous life. The Ten Commandments, the Beatitudes (see next page), and the Great Commandment of love help you understand how to act justly. Yet there are those who disobey God’s law and ignore Jesus’ example of loving others.

As a consequence, many people still suffer injustice.


virtues good spiritual habits that strengthen you and enable you to do what is right and good. They develop over time with our practice and openness to God's grace.

Peace

What is the relationship between peace and justice?

Where there is an absence of justice, there is no **peace**. Only people and nations who live in justice will know real peace.

The Law addressed issues of peace and justice among the Israelites, such as paying workers their wages on time. But not everyone listened. About eight centuries before Christ, three prophets spoke of people living without justice and peace. God said through the prophets that the people would bear the consequences of their sin, but he would never stop loving them.

Three Prophets

Hosea reported that lying, murder, stealing, and adultery had replaced fidelity and mercy. Yet he prophesied that one day God would heal the sinners and love them freely. "I will be like the dew for Israel: he will blossom like the lily..." (**Hosea 14:6**).

Amos observed that the weak were trampled down, that the just were oppressed, and that bribery was everywhere. Yet Amos also pointed out that one day God would restore his People, Israel, and return them to their land. The prophet Micah reminded people that the path to righteousness was simple.



Justice Seekers and Peacemakers

Today, the Church continues the work of the Old Testament prophets. The Church helps you understand the responsibility you have to work for justice and peace as Jesus did. We come to the realization that when we love God with our whole heart, we instinctively reach out in love to others. There are certain areas that need your close attention.

The failure to give others what is due them is an injustice and goes against the **common good**. When personal sin leads whole communities or societies to make such choices, the sin grows. This kind of sin can be called **social sin**. Racism, sexism, and terrorism are examples of social sins. Wherever there is hatred, envy, prejudice, or division between people, there is no real peace. A just world is a sign of the Kingdom of God.

The Common Good

Life

What does it mean to promote human dignity?

A just world is a sign of the Kingdom of God. Justice begins when you recognize the dignity, or inner worth, of each person.

God created each of us, and he has a plan for our lives. We are all valuable to him and each other. When you respect and promote human dignity, you honor God, in whose image and likeness humans are created.

- Insist on respect for your body and the bodies of others. (See 1 Corinthians 6:19–20.)




People of Faith

Blessed Maria Vicenta, 1867–1949

July 30

Blessed Maria Vicenta was born in Mexico. She was known for her devotion to the Infant Jesus. After she recovered from a serious illness, she decided to dedicate her life to God by helping those who were poor and sick. She knew that every person has an inner worth that must be respected. To help do that, she founded the Servants of the Holy Trinity and the Poor. The Servants cared for the wounded during the Mexican Revolution and opened seventeen hospitals, clinics, and nurseries. Blessed Maria and her sisters worked to create a society in which the dignity of all was important.

Litany of Justice and Peace

This litany prayer helps us to voice our prayers of intercession, asking God's help to make us his instruments of bringing peace and justice to all the world.

All: help us bear peace to the world.

CHILDREN AT THIS AGE >>>

How They Understand Justice The social perspective of your child is still somewhat limited. What is fair and just in matters concerning himself or herself can sometimes be limited to what he or she wants in the situation. Still, when children this age step back from this to view larger issues in society and in the world as a whole, they have a strong sense of justice and a desire to do what they can to make the world a better place.



CONSIDER THIS >>>

When have you seen or read something that made you ask, "How can we have let that happen?"

When communities of people act together in sin or allow sin to happen, the result can be horrendous. Racism, sexism, terrorism, and lack of respect for human life are all examples of what can happen when people look away or participate in what may seem small ways. As Catholics, we know that "sins give rise to social situations and institutions that are contrary to the divine goodness. 'Structures of sin' are the expression and effect of personal sins. They lead their victims to do evil in their turn. In an analogous sense, they constitute 'social sin'" (CCC, 1869).
