# Lives of Service




Leader: Gracious God, make us all your servants.

# Called to Serve

# What is the meaning of the word vocation?

Serving others is an essential part of being a baptized person. Jesus placed great importance on it. At his Last Supper, Jesus knew that his Death was near. Knowing that he would not have another chance to teach his disciples before he went to the Cross, Jesus did a surprising thing.



# The Washing of the Disciples' Feet

Jesus got up from the table and poured water into a basin. He then knelt to wash his disciples' feet. His disciples were very surprised at first. When it was Peter's turn, he objected by saying, "You will never wash my feet."

Jesus told him, "Unless I wash you, you will have no inheritance with me."

At this remark Peter looked serious and replied, "Master, then not only my feet, but my hands and head as well."

Then Jesus returned to his seat at the table. He asked his disciples, "Do you realize what I have done for you?" Then he explained, "If I, therefore, the master and teacher, have washed your feet, you ought to wash one another's feet." Based on John 13:1-15

# The Cost of Serving Others

In Jesus' time, people who were poor walked barefoot, and those of a higher class wore sandals. Washing the feet of guests when they entered a home was a job for servants—the owner of the house would not do it. It was shocking for Jesus' disciples to see him do such a thing.

Jesus' action was a sign that his disciples needed to be purified before they could enter his Kingdom, just as you were purified by your Baptism. The washing of the disciples' feet was also a reminder that serving others would not always be easy. The disciples would have to humble themselves, just as Jesus would be humbled by his Passion and Death. Serving others involves helping others even when it is inconvenient or difficult to do so.

# Your Vocation

Today, followers of Jesus usually are not asked to wash people's feet, but all of us are called to love and serve God and our neighbor. This is part of our **vocation**, God's plan for us and the purpose for which he made us.

When you are older, you may decide to live out your vocation by answering God's call to the ordained priesthood, to religious life, to marriage, or, perhaps, to the committed single life.

You may not yet know the vocation to which God is calling you. By praying, learning more about Jesus, and looking at the gifts and talents God has given you, you will discover your vocation.



Holy Orders the Sacrament in which a baptized man is ordained to teach the faithful, lead divine worship, and govern the Church; ordained ministers serve as bishops, priests, or deacons

Magisterium the teaching office of the Church, which is all of the bishops in union with the Pope. The Magisterium has the teaching authority to interpret the Word of God found in Scripture and Tradition.

# Living the Call

# How do people live out their baptismal call?

Everyone who is baptized is called to continue the mission of Jesus by serving others. But some are called to ordained ministry through the Sacrament of Holy Orders.

Holy Orders confers a sacred power, through the laying on of hands by the bishop, for serving the faithful by teaching, leading the people in worship, and pastoral governing. Bishops, priests, and deacons all share in this Sacrament of Holy Orders. Ordained men are marked forever as Christ's representatives.

A **bishop** serves the Church as the pastor and teacher of his diocese. All the bishops work together

with the Pope for the good of the whole Church and make up the Magisterium, or the teaching authority of the Church.

**Priests** assist the bishop within a diocese. As pastor of a parish, a priest shares the bishop's work in the diocese. Priests act *in persona Christi*, as a representative of Christ, and preside in celebrations of the Sacraments for the parish.

**Permanent deacons** are ordained ministers who serve the diocese and parish by assisting in liturgical roles and by doing works of charity. Married men can be called to this ministry.

# **Consecrated Life**

Some priests live in religious communities in what is called **consecrated religious life**. Members of these communities dedicate themselves to serving God by following the charism, or special grace, of the community and its founder. There are also many communities of religious sisters and brothers. Members of religious communities may teach, care for the sick, work as missionaries, or do other good works.

Members of religious communities profess in public to live three vows, or sacred promises, that are found at the heart of the Gospel—poverty, chastity, and obedience. These vows are also called the evangelical counsels.

The Evangelical Counsels								
Poverty	The choice to live a simple life and to share material possessions in community.							
Chastity	The choice to maintain the right balance of body and spirit in human sexuality. This also a virtue that requires the proper integration of sexuality according to one's stallife. For men and women religious, this means living a celibate life.							
Obedience	The choice to follow and obey God's will as it is expressed through the guidance of the community's leaders, the charism of the community, and the individual's conscience.							

Those who accept the call to ordained priesthood or consecrated religious life choose lives of service for the sake of God's People. Because they are human, they can make mistakes. But they are always worthy of respect, because of their human dignity and their willingness to make a difficult and lifelong commitment in service to God's People.

### Saint Ignatius of Loyola, 1491–1556

Saint Ignatius was a soldier. While recovering from a wound, he read a book about the life of Christ and decided to become a priest. He founded an order of priests called the Society of Jesus, also called the Jesuits. Saint Ignatius wrote a book called *Spiritual Exercises*, which people still use today as a way to help others experience Jesus' love. His motto was: "Do everything for the honor and glory of God." The Jesuits are famous for their learning and teaching. They continue to spread the Good News of Jesus in parishes, high schools, and universities.

### CONSIDER THIS >>>


Do you think it is more difficult to hear God's call in the world today?

Despite the "noise" of our culture, God continues to call each baptized person in a unique way to respond to Jesus' invitation to service. We call this a vocation. As Catholics, we know that "ordination to the priesthood is always a call and a gift from God. Christ reminded his Apostles that they needed to ask the Lord of the harvest to send laborers into the harvest. Those who seek the priesthood respond generously to God's call using the words of the prophet, 'Here I am, send me (Is. 6:8)"" (USCCA, p. 269).
