

Our Catholic Tradition

- Jesus Christ is the Son of God who took on human flesh to redeem us from sin and show us the way to the Father. Because he is true God and true man, Jesus gives us the perfect example of how to live the life the Father planned for us. (CCC, 520)
- The Beatitudes challenge us to live by the values of God's Kingdom and understand that true happiness comes from the hope of eternal life with God. (CCC, 1726, 1728)
- Because God the Father loved human beings, he sent his Son, who freely chose to become human and to offer himself in order to redeem us from the effects of Original Sin and our own sins. (CCC, 620, 621)

Our Catholic Life

- We are called to a life of discipleship: this involves accepting Jesus' invitation to believe in and follow him by studying his ways and putting them into practice. (CCC, 2466)

- Through his Paschal Mystery, Jesus conquered death and makes it possible for those who have faith to experience new life through the Seven Sacraments. (CCC, 1076)





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
True God, True Man

How is Jesus like all of us?

At one time or another, everyone wants to excel—to maximize his or her abilities to the fullest. People often say that it's human nature to want to be the best at something. Is that what it means to be "fully human"? But if you fail, is it okay to just remind yourself, "After all, I'm only human"?

Jesus is "true man and true God," fully human but also fully Divine. He is God. And he is also a human being, a man who walked on Earth, like all of us. He lived the fully human life we are made to live: coming from God and going toward God. So what does that mean for us as his followers?

Sometimes it's hard for us to grasp that Jesus actually lived a human life. Can you picture Jesus as a small child learning to put on his sandals? On sunny days, he might have wanted to go outside and play instead of finishing his chores. Maybe he got tired from too much studying.



Yet, these kinds of things probably happened. How do we know? They are the kinds of things that happen to all human beings—and in all families. We all face new challenges, feel tired, and become confused. After all, we're human!

The Son of God Became One of Us

Jesus is true man, like us in all things except sin. He is also true God. Jesus has two natures:

- He has a Divine nature. Jesus is the Son of God, the Second Divine Person of the Holy Trinity.
- He has a human nature. He was born
 of a human mother, and he had to be
 fed, kept warm, and loved like all other
 human babies.

The Son of God chose to become a man in order to bring us back to his Father and show us how to live as God intended. Jesus not only brings us closer to the Father, but he also makes it possible for us to become more like him and the Father. God's Son became human to share his divinity with us. Because of that, we can become united with God the Father. When the Son of God became the Son of Man, we also became God's sons and daughters.

God helps us as his children with the grace to live the full lives he calls us to live. When we fail, we need to accept our disappointments with humility. When our thoughts and actions lead us away from God and living his law, we need to turn to God for forgiveness and strength to do better.

The Joyful Mysteries

When praying the Rosary, Catholics remember events from Jesus' and Mary's lives, called the Mysteries of the Rosary. One group of these events is called the Joyful Mysteries. They focus on the great gift of the Incarnation and the joy of the Son of God sharing our human nature.

- The Annunciation—The Angel Gabriel announces to Mary that she has been chosen to be the Mother of Jesus.
- The Visitation—Mary, who is pregnant, visits her cousin Elizabeth, who is also pregnant. Elizabeth's son grows up to be John the Baptist.
- The Nativity—Jesus is born.
- The Presentation of the Child Jesus at the Temple—Joseph and Mary present the child Jesus at the Temple in Jerusalem. A man named Simeon had been promised that he would not die before he saw the



Messiah. Simeon recognizes Jesus as the fulfillment of God's promise.



Jesus Is the Way to God

How does Jesus show us the way?

Before they were called "Christians," the disciples who followed Jesus were called followers of "The Way." Jesus showed them the way to God. He also showed them a new way to live, a way based on truth and love.

Scripture

"I am the way and the truth and the life." John 14:6

Go to the Source

Jesus used words to describe the Father, Read Luke 11:9-13 and find out why Jesus spoke about giving a hungry child a scorpion or a snake, instead of an egg or some fish.

The Apostles and disciples of Jesus learned about God in two ways. Jesus talked about God, letting them know that God is Father, and Jesus showed them God the Father

through his life, the life of the Son. Jesus used words to describe what the Father was like, and Jesus used actions to demonstrate what he was like.

Jesus was able to give us a better picture of God—a picture of a loving, gentle, and affectionate Father-a God who takes care of us and gives us what we need, including expectations and rules to keep us safe and help us grow. He is eternal Father and source of all life. Jesus told us, "For everyone who asks, receives; and the one who seeks, finds . . ." (Luke 11:10) Jesus' words and actions still show us the way today.

Titles for Jesus

We call Jesus by many titles that describe who he is and what he does. You're probably familiar with Savior, Lord, Christ, and Lamb of God. How about Mediator and Substantial Image?

A mediator brings together those who might normally be separated or apart, reconciling differences between them. Because of his uniqueness as true God and true man, Jesus alone is the mediator between God the Father and humans. As our intermediary or bridge to God the Father, and by his sacrifice that makes reconciliation possible, Jesus is

called the **Mediator**. He brings us closer to the Father by his words and his actions.

When Jesus became man, he remained God. So when we look at Jesus, a human being, we get to see God in living color. He is sometimes called the Substantial Image of the Father. An image is a visible likeness. Substantial implies belonging to its nature. When we say Jesus is the Substantial Image of the Father, we mean that he is a visible image of the true nature of God. In the Son of God, you can see what God the Father is like. Here are some ways Jesus used actions to demonstrate God's love for us:

- healing many people who were sick or injured (see Matthew 8:14-17)
- spending time and eating with people who were unpopular (see Luke 5:30–32)
- feeding people who were hungry (see Mark 6:30-44)

The Way to Live

What did Jesus want to show us?

Jesus gave his followers many examples of how they could become more like him.

When you follow his example, you are acting like he did. The more you do so, the more you can discover the person God intends you to be and live the best life possible.

Jesus' Example 0 taking time to pray; see Mark 6:45-46. having a good relationship with his parents; see Luke 2:51-52. relying on his good friends; see Luke 8:1-3. expressing deep feelings; see John 11:32-37. talking about things with those who disagree; see Mark 12:13-17. listening to others and sometimes changing his mind; see Matthew 15:21-28. taking care of others in need; see Matthew 9:27-31. forgiving his enemies; see Luke 23:33-34. saying no to temptation; see Matthew 4:1-11. standing up for others; see Matthew 21:12-13.

Jesus didn't come to show us the way to play perfect chess or piano, swim, paint, or get straight As. Striving to use the gifts and talents God has given us is a good thing. But, Jesus is most concerned with what importance we give God in our lives, how we treat our families and friends, how we pray, how we care for people we don't know, and how we forgive our enemies. Sometimes these things are a lot harder than doing laps in the pool or practicing scales on the keyboard.

Of all the good that God wants for you, he most wants you to live in his love, to know his happiness, and to become like him. You do all of these things when you follow in Jesus' footsteps and become his disciple.

People of Faith

Saint Maximilian Kolbe, 1894-1941

When Raymund Kolbe became a priest, he changed his name to Maximilian Maria in honor of Mary. During World War II, he provided shelter for those fleeing the Nazis, including 2,000 Jews. In 1941, Father Kolbe was arrested by the Nazis and taken to the death camp of Auschwitz. While he was there, the Nazis decided to starve some prisoners to death as a punishment. He offered


to take the place of a man who had a wife and children. The man whose life he saved was present at the ceremony of his canonization in 1982. The Church celebrates his feast day on August 14.
