

Our Catholic Tradition

- We are disciples of Christ together in his Church, following his example by trusting in the Father, learning, praying, and reaching out to others. (CCC, 520)
- The Church is both visible and spiritual, the Mystical Body of Christ united in and to Christ to continue his mission in the world. (CCC, 779)
- The Church has a mission to bring all people to believe in God and to be baptized. She is both a sign and instrument of the communion between God and his People. (CCC, 780)

Our Catholic Life

- Just as Jesus sent the first disciples out, he wants us to be a sign of the Kingdom of God, and to follow Church teachings. (CCC, 941, 942)



A Surprise Invitation

What prompted the first disciples to follow Jesus?

We've probably all known someone who helped us see things differently or to make a commitment. Sometimes that person also leads us to see what matters most in life and to make decisions based on those priorities.

In the time of Jesus, just as today, teachers, politicians, and religious leaders attracted followers. Saint John the Baptist was a preacher whom people followed, but he was preparing the way for the Messiah. When Jesus arrived, John told his followers to follow Jesus. John said, "Now I have seen and testified that he is the Son of God" (John 1:34).

John's followers knew what to expect from him. They must have had to think about leaving the leader they had trusted to follow someone new.

Tell a Friend

Some of John's followers went to see what Jesus was like. After they saw him and heard him speak, they wanted to get to know him better. Many became his **disciples**, and told their friends about Jesus. Jesus asked some to follow him. Other people followed because a friend like Philip told them to come and see Jesus.

"Philip found Nathanael and told him, 'We have found the one about whom Moses wrote in the law, and also the prophets, Jesus, son of Joseph, from Nazareth.' But Nathanael said to him, 'Can anything good come from Nazareth?' Philip said to him, 'Come and see.'" John 1:45–46

Decisions to Make

Each new disciple already had a family and a job. When Jesus invited them, some people asked if they could have a little time to decide. They wanted to go home and take care of things first. (See Luke 9:61–62.) But Jesus was looking for people who had been looking for his coming and were ready and waiting to go with him. Some people were ready.

Jesus was a vibrant, wise speaker who spoke with authority like only God could


do. Some of the things Jesus said confused people. His preaching both challenged and gave hope. Some of the things he did surprised and astounded others. His healing and forgiving of sin brought life and raised questions about his authority. But one thing is certain: people were talking about Jesus in all the towns and villages in the area.

Wouldn't you want to meet a man who was changing people's lives, making things right, and giving people what they desperately needed? Jesus offered the people God's love and compassion, a purpose for living, and hope for renewed life with him and others.

How did the Apostles and their successors lead?

After the disciples had been with him awhile, Jesus gave the Twelve a mission, sending them out two by two. We read in Mark 6:7–13 that they were to announce the coming of the Kingdom of God and were even given the authority to cure some of the sick people they met as they traveled. We also read in Mark 6:7-13 that the Twelve disciples had some important instructions from Jesus. He told them:

- bring no money or food
- do not pack a bag or bring extra clothes
- find a home to stay where the people welcome you
- leave a town that does not welcome you, and shake the dust of that town from your shoes

Jesus wanted his disciples to have total dependence upon God the Father to take care of them. He wanted them to travel light.



We Receive Guidance

We know Jesus had many followers. But Jesus chose twelve men to be his **Apostles** and to share in his work and mission in a special way. The Twelve were Jesus' closest followers. The Apostles continued Jesus' ministry after his Ascension to Heaven.

The night before he died, Jesus said to the Apostles at the Last Supper: "The Advocate, the holy Spirit that the Father will send in my name—he will teach you everything and remind you of all that [I] told you" (John 14:26).

Since then and to this day the **Church** has been built on the faith and foundation of the Apostles. This is what we mean when



we say the Church is apostolic. One of the four Marks of the Church—the essential characteristics that distinguish Christ's Church and her mission—is that she is apostolic.

The work the Apostles began has been continued down through the ages. The teachings they received from Jesus and his Holy Spirit have been handed on through them to us in the Church today.

How do we know what the Church teaches? How does she hand down the teachings of Christ to everyone? Here is a list of places where Church teaching is found, including **doctrine**, encyclicals and other documents of the Church.

Disciples in the Church Today


What does it mean to be a disciple in the Church right here and now?

We have the Church to guide us in all parts of our lives and in everything we do. The Church shows us how to live as Jesus lived. His life and his teachings are light showing us the way to Heaven.

Scripture

Jesus spoke to them again, saying,
"I am the light of the world. Whoever
follows me will not walk in darkness,
but will have the light of life." John 8:12

We never have to find our way through life alone. In the Church, we belong to a family of faith, a community of disciples who are following Jesus together. We turn to other Church members for support, guidance,



and encouragement. We ask God's forgiveness through the Church. We join with others to help people who are in need. Together we can feed the hungry, shelter the homeless, clothe the naked, visit the sick, and try to change laws and policies that do not protect life and promote human dignity. No one could do as much alone as we can all do together.

A Praying Community

The Holy Spirit also teaches us to pray as disciples of Jesus. We pray alone, and we pray together with the Church in communal prayer and worship. Whether we are praying prayers of blessing, petition, intercession, thanksgiving, or praise and adoration, it is the Holy Spirit who inspires us and calls us to pray.

The most important way we pray together is the celebration of the Eucharist. We are worshipping God together and we are receiving the Body and Blood of Christ.

As we grow in our faith, we learn new ways of prayer. Different ways of praying and living as a disciple, known as spiritualities, have developed over the centuries. In our two thousand years as a Church, many great Saints have guided others in ways of prayer.

There are several "schools" of prayer and Christian spirituality. They are all part of the Church's living Tradition of prayer, and although they are very different, they all come from the Holy Spirit.

When we come together for Mass, we are praying the Church's central and most important prayer.

Schools of Prayer


- Spiritual direction: learning alone from a guide
- Prayer groups: learning to pray with others; Church ministers leading and teaching liturgical prayer
- Catechesis: learning about prayer through classes and ministry involvement; consecrated religious teaching contemplative (wordless) prayer

People of Faith

Saint Théodore (Anne-Thérèse Guérin), 1798–1856

After Anne-Thérèse Guérin took her final vows to become a nun, she and other sisters established the Academy of St. Mary-of-the-Woods at Terre Haute, Indiana, the first Catholic women's liberal arts college in the United States. During her nearly sixteen years of ministry in Indiana, Mother Théodore encountered

countless hardships, but her faith did not waver. She told the sisters, "With Jesus, what shall we have to fear?" Mother Théodore was canonized by Pope Benedict XVI in 2006. The Church celebrates her feast day on October 3.
