




We became members of the Catholic Church.

The Lesson Your Child Learned

Choosing Baptism for your child indicated your commitment to fostering his or her Christian growth. In this chapter the children learned that at Baptism they became members of the Church.



Living the Lesson.

In the house where I grew up, we had a spot alongside our back doorway where Mom and Dad would measure the height of my brother and me every year on our birthdays. When Dad would paint that room, he'd always leave that strip unpainted so the record of our growth would remain visible. The day we moved from that house, I took one last look at all the empty rooms. I recall seeing those penciled lines, with our initials and the dates next to them, and they represented all the good times we'd had together in that home, as well as all the things my brother and I had learned about life, about family, and about ourselves.

Growth means life. Jesus said, "I came so that they might have life and have it more abundantly." (John 10:10) Your child is at a wondrous moment in his or her growth, and you get the privilege of witnessing this miracle as it unfolds. Make sure to stop once in a while and pay attention to how far your child has come and how many wondrous opportunities lie ahead. And don't forget to mark your own growth now and again. Take stock of how you measure up physically, intellectually, emotionally, and spiritually. Are you taking Jesus up on his offer of having life more abundantly?
